Since the work of moving Mr. Lewis' house should be done this fall, while the weather is good, and the excavations for the Dairy Building done during the months of January and February,

5....Prof. Ainslie asks that his salary for August be paid. I have ordered it withheld on the technical ground that Prof. Ainslie did not give us the three months' notice required by the By-laws, but in reality because he treated us with no consideration in the matter of his resigning. I learn from the Bureau of Entomology that he accepted a position with the Government at a salary of \$1,400 on

June 27th, and his salary and services began on July 1st. When rumor became current on the campus that he was not going to return, Prof. Perkins and I both wrote to him early in August, and demanded to know his intentions. We then received his resignation, dated July 23rd, although the letter was postmarked Nashville, August 11th. He had been allowed to go off on vacation in the early part of the summer, on the distinct understanding with Prof. Perkins that he was to return to do a month's Institute Work.

I respectfully request that this matter be referred to the Finance Committee with power to act. With this Committee, I can go fully into the case and exhibit all the correspondence that has passed.

6....I respectfully recommend that the Printery be allowed to overdraw its appropriations by the amount equal to its cash receipts, or be allowed to re-invest its cash receipts in labor and material. As now handled, it is impossible for the Printery to make a creditable showing. Unless a complicated system involving the keeping of the labor, materials, depreciation and upkeep on each job separate, the Printery makes its worst showing when it does the most work.

7....I fear that very little regard is had by the County Boards for the actual need of the scholarship applicants, - at least this important qualification is not given the weight it should have. As one result, we have students who have finished our Freshman, Sophomore, and even Junior Class, going back home and during the vacation standing the Freshman scholarship examinations, in this way discouraging others from attempting them. I believe that attendance at College without a scholarship should be construed as prima-facie evidence that a student is not in need of the State's bounty. Would it not be wise to consider this matter in connection with pending changes in the scholarship laws?

17....An appropriation of \$500.00 for conducting the Hog Cholera Serum work was, I think, unintentionally overlooked in considering the July budget. I consulted with the Executive Committee in regard to this matter at their meeting on Oct. 11th, and the following resolution was adopted by that Committee:-

18....The general department and health of the cadets are excellent. Resolved:- "That we advise the Acting President to go forward with the work under such rules and regulations as may be agreed upon by the Departments concerned, and approved by the Acting President."

I ask that the appropriation of \$500.00 be made for this work. in

19....I request that an appropriation of \$500.00 be made for cement walks between the main buildings. I bring this matter up at this time, in order that we may avail ourselves of the convict labor during the winter months when they can best be spared from the Farm.

In this same connection, I wish to say that I am thinking of grading down the remainder of the hill next to the Parade Ground on the North-east side, so as to improve the appearance of that part of the campus, and get the necessary earth to extend the Drill Field, which is not now large enough for Dress Parade.

20....I recommend that an appropriation of \$300.00 be made to

improve the lockers in the Cadets' rooms.

INFORMATION.

13....I beg to report that the uniform system of book-keeping in the Divisions of each Department, ordered by the Board at its recent meeting, has been introduced and, in spite of some grumbling on the part of a few, is working smoothly.

14....Acting upon instructions from the President of your Board, I beg to submit herewith a summarized statement from the Jones Detective Agency, and a report dealing with the appointment and promotion of those teachers and officers who are related to members of the Board.

15....The College is in excellent financial condition. On October 29th, the College had to its credit in bank, including funds from all sources, \$23,696.57. The fertilizer receipts up to October 1st, amount to \$10,161.96, which is \$2,850.28 below the receipts for the same time last year. This small difference is likely due to the lateness of this year's cotton seed meal crop.

16....The general deportment and health of the cadets are excellent. In the main, the various agencies of the College are working well and in thorough harmony, and we seem to have entered upon, not only the most populous, but I hope the most successful season in the history of the College.

P.S. I am considering the question of doing away with the cadet waiters in the Mess-Hall, and using the negroes now employed as cooks, dish washers, sweepers, etc. for that purpose.

The change will effect a saving in wages along of \$689.35 per

session, and will conduce to greater system and better discipline in the Mess-hall, will give the Mess-hall a neater appearance, and will give the boys more efficient and neater service.

I do not think that the cadet corps should be called upon to contribute nearly \$700.00 to twenty-eight of their comrades, some of whom are probably less needy than many of the contributors. We have no way of determining the need of those who apply for the positions of waiter, and often I believe these positions are sought more for the purpose of getting the pick of the food than for the monetary help involved.

The contemplated change was first recommended to me last session by the Commandant, and it is now recommended by Mr. Schletter and the Commandant. It has the unanimous approval of my Student Co-operative Committees, representing every class in College.

S. M. MARTIN

Mr. S. M. Martin was elected August 27, 1894, to the position of teacher in the Sub-Fresh Department, at a salary of \$600.00, to begin the following September 1st.

At the June Meeting, 1897, along with Messrs Lee and Klugh, his salary was raised to \$800.00. At the February meeting 1900, along with Messrs Lee and Klugh, his salary was raised to \$900.00. Several others had their salaries raised at the same time. At the March meeting, 1901, his salary was raised to \$1,000.

During the summer of 1902, Mr. Martin married Miss Conroy Simpson. Previous to this, he had no relation to any member of the Board.

Gentlemen:-

In accordance with instructions from your President, I have made a careful investigation into the circumstances surrounding the election, appointment and promotion of the teachers and officers of the College who are related to members of the Board, and who are referred to in the article which Pres. Mell gave to the Legislative Committee last December. It seems that at the March meeting, 1900, the President did not recommend Prof. Martin for election, and he was not elected. However, the office records show that at the July meeting, his election was made as above stated.

In making this report, I have consulted the minutes of the Board, the correspondence files of the President's office, and have given each teacher or officer concerned an opportunity to make a full statement of his case. Putting together the information gained from these various sources, I believe the following to be an accurate and impartial statement of the facts in connection with the appointment, election and promotion of the following teachers and officers.

S. M. MARTIN.
Mr. S. M. Martin was elected August 8, 1898, to the position of teacher in the Sub-Fresh. Department, at a salary of \$600.00, to begin the following September 1st. At the June Meeting, 1899, along with Messrs Lee and Klugh, his salary was raised to \$800.00. At the February meeting 1900, along with Messrs Lee and Klugh, his salary was raised to \$900.00. Several others had their salaries raised at the same time. At the March meeting, 1901, his salary was raised to \$1,000.

During the summer of 1901, Mr. Martin married Miss Conway Simpson. Previous to this, he had no relation to any member of the Board. At the June meeting, 1902, in accordance with the general

scheme of salary adjustment suggested by Pres. Mell, and approved by a special Committee consisting of Messrs Simpson, Tillman, Norris and Pres. Mell, Mr. Martin's salary was raised to \$1,200.

At the July meeting, 1906, when another general increase of salaries was made, affecting a large number of the faculty members, his salary was raised to \$1,700, and his rank changed from Assistant to Associate Professor.

At the July meeting, 1908, upon the recommendation of Pres. Mell, Prof. Martin was unanimously elected Professor of Mathematics, at the usual professor's salary, \$1,900. It seems that at the March meeting, 1908, the President did not recommend Prof. Martin for election, and he was not elected. However, the office records show that at the July meeting, his election was made as above stated, upon the recommendation of President Mell.

W. W. KLUGH.

Messrs Klugh and Lee were elected as Assistants, December 14, 1896, at a salary of \$300.00. At the July meeting, 1897, their salaries were increased to \$325.00. At the June meeting, 1898, Major Klugh was relieved of duties in the Military Department, and detailed to give his entire time to the Sub-Freshman work, and his salary was increased to \$600.00 per annum. At the June meeting, 1899, he was transferred to the Mechanical Department as an Assistant Instructor, and his salary, along with Messrs Lee and Martin, was raised to \$800.00, to commence the following Sept. 1st. At the February meeting, 1900, along with Messrs Lee and Martin, his salary was raised to \$900.00.

During the summer of 1901, he was married to Miss Jean S. Simpson. Prior to this time, he was not related to any member of the Board.

At the July meeting, 1903, when Pres. Mell's system of salaries was recommended by the Board Committee consisting of Messrs Simpson, Tillman, Norris and Pres. Mell, he was made Assistant Professor, and his salary, along with others, was raised to \$1,200.

When the general increase of salaries was made at the July meeting, 1906, Mr. Klugh's salary, along with the other Assistant Professors, was raised to \$1,500.

A. G. HOLMES.

Mr. Holmes was elected to fill the Chair vacated by the promotion of Mr. M. E. Bradley, as Instructor in English, History and Geography, at a salary of \$1,200, at the July meeting, 1906. Mr. Holmes states that he had it upon good authority that Pres. Mell nominated him for the place, and a letter from Pres. Mell to Mr. Holmes, under date of July 12th, in which he congratulates him upon his election, seems to confirm Mr. Holmes' information. At the end of his first year of service, Mr. Holmes was permanently elected upon the recommendation of Pres. Mell. This is stated in a letter from Dr. Mell to Mr. Holmes under date of August 26, 1907. At the July meeting, 1908, the Board decided to elect an Assistant in the Division of History, and the President of the College presented the names of Mr. A. G. Holmes and J. H. Hook as applicants. However, no election resulted. In the minutes of the August meeting, 1908, the following item appears:-

"The attention of the Board was invited by the President of the College to a vacancy in the History Department of the College, and for this position, Dr. Mell, the President, presented the applications of Professors J. H. Hook and A. G. Holmes, Clemson College, with the recommendation that Prof. Holmes be elected to fill the vacancy."

Prof. Holmes was then elected to his present position as Assistant Professor of History, with no increase of salary over his previous position.

Previous to his connection with the College, Mr. Holmes was married to Miss Anna, daughter of Col. R. W. Simpson. He recommended him for this position, but I presume that he did. This position he now holds.

B. H. JOHNSTONE.

At the close of the session of 1905, Mr. S. W. Reaves, Assistant Professor of Mathematics, resigned. Mr. J. E. Hunter was promoted to Mr. Reaves' place, leaving vacant Mr. Hunter's position. To this latter position, Mr. Johnstone was appointed by Pres. Mell in August, 1905.

At the July meeting, 1906, Mr. Johnstone was promoted to the position of Assistant Professor, teaching Mathematics, German and French.

At the July meeting, 1908, Pres. Mell recommended that Asst. Prof. Shanklin be promoted to the position of Associate Prof. Mathematics, vice Prof. Martin promoted, and that Assistant Professors Hunter, Johnstone and Bramlett be promoted in line. This gave Prof. Johnstone the position of Assistant Professor of Mathematics, at a salary of \$1,500.

Prof. Johnstone is a half nephew of Mr. Alan Johnstone,

President of your Board.

M. E. BRADLEY.

At the July meeting, 1901, Mr. Bradley was elected Tutor, at a salary of \$50.00 per month. Mr. Bradley states that this election was based upon the recommendation of Dr. Hartzog, who was then President of the College.

At the June meeting, 1903, when the general scheme of salaries proposed by President Mell, and recommended by a Committee consisting of Messrs Simpson, Tillman, Norris and Pres. Mell, was adopted, Mr. Bradley, along with Messrs Gantt, Hunter, Dargan and Parker, was raised to \$700.00.

At the July meeting, 1904, his salary was raised to \$900.00.

Mr. Bradley states that this is in accordance with a recommendation of Pres. Mell. At the July meeting, 1906, Prof. McLucas having resigned, a vacancy occurred in the English Division of the Academic Department, and Mr. Bradley was elected Assistant Professor in that Division, at a salary of \$1,500. I do not know whether the President recommended him for this position, but I presume that he did. This position he now holds.

The following minute is taken from the meeting of the Board, July 14, 1908, which has reference to Mr. Bradley's election to his present position as Chemist to the Experiment Station:-

Bradley, and a brother of Mr. W. W. Bradley, who succeeded his father as a life member of the Board.

"The position of Chemist for S. S. Experiment Station was then taken up. The President of the College submitted the following names of applicants as recommended by Prof. M. S. Hargin, - namely,

Charles Walker, Charleston; S. D. Olson, Illinois; R. D. Gilbert, Connecticut; A. R. Matt, T. W. KEITT; H. C. Hamner, Virginia.

Moved by Col. Simpson that Mr. Thomas E. Keitt, now a Chemist in the Chemical Department of the College, be elected to the position of State Pres. Hartzog appointed Mr. Keitt as Assistant Professor in English, to act as a substitute for Prof. Daniel, who had been given a year's leave of absence. This appointment was made during the summer of 1901, and his salary was made \$100.00 per month, beginning Sept. 1st.

At the March meeting of the Board, 1902, Dr. Hartzog recommended Prof. Keitt for a permanent place, and he was elected as "teacher in Fresh. and Sub-Fresh." at a salary of \$1,200 per annum.

At the June meeting, 1903, when the scale of salaries suggested by Pres. Mell, and recommended by the Committee consisting of Messrs Simpson, Tillman, Norris and Pres. Mell was adopted, Prof. Keitt was made an Assistant Professor, and given the salary attaching to that position, which was the same as he had been receiving as "Teacher in Fresh. and Sub-Fresh.", namely \$1,200.

When the general increase of salaries was made at the July meeting, 1906, Mr. Keitt's salary, along with the other Assistant Professors, was raised to \$1,500.

Prof. Keitt is a cousin by blood, and a brother-in-law by marriage, to Mr. John E. Wannamaker, one of the life Trustees.

In December, 1906, THOMAS E. KEITT, Taylor died, and Mr. Tucker,

In february, 1907, a vacancy occurred in the Analytical work of the Chemical Department, due to the resignation of Mr. C. C. McConnell. Col. M. B. Hardin, Director of the Department, recommended to Pres. Mell the appointment of Mr. Keitt, and in February 1907,

Pres. Mell appointed him Assistant Chemist at a salary of \$900.00. At the meeting of the Board, Feb. 26, 1907, his appointment was confirmed.

The following minute is taken from the meeting of the Board, July 14, 1908, which has reference to Mr. Keitt's election to his present position as Chemist to the Experiment Station:-

"The position of Chemist for S. C. Experiment Station was then taken up. The President of the College submitted the following names of applicants as recommended by Prof. M. B. Hardin, - namely,

Charles Walker, Charleston; G. O. Olson, Illinois; R. D. Gilbert, Connecticut; M. E. Matheson, Kansas; N. C. Hammer, Virginia. Moved by Col. Simpson that Mr. Thomas E. Keitt, now a Chemist in the Chemical Department of the College, be elected to the position of State Chemist.

The motion was unanimously adopted. The President cast the unanimous ballot, Mr. Wannamaker being excused from voting."

The salary of the Station Chemist was fixed in the schedule of Experiment Station salaries adopted by the Board in March, 1908, at \$1,900.

In connection with the above, I quote the following recommendation from the report of Prof. J. N. Harper, Director of the Experiment Station, to Pres. Mell under date of July 8, 1908:-

"That Mr. Thomas E. Keitt be appointed to the position as Chemist to the Experiment Station, and that he receive a salary of \$1,200 per year."

Mr. Keitt is a nephew of Mr. John E. Wannamaker.

Mr. Evans is a son of Mr. W. D. Evans.

W. C. TUCKER.

MISS MINNIE B. WANNAMAKER.

In January, 1905, Pres. Mell appointed Mr. Tucker as Assistant to the Commandant at a salary of \$40.00 per month, and with the promise to recommend him for permanent position at the February meeting of the Board. (Letter of Dr. Mell under date of Jan. 13, '05)

At the February meeting, 1905, the action of the President in appointing Mr. Tucker was approved. At the June meeting, 1905, his appointment as Secretary to the Commandant was made permanent, at a salary of \$600.00.

In December, 1906, Mr. George E. Taylor died, and Mr. Tucker, through the President, made application for the position. At the meeting of the Board in December, 1906, he was elected Assistant Book-keeper at a salary of \$1,100, Mr. Hard being promoted to Mr. Taylor's position as Book-keeper. In March, 1908, Mr. Hard died, and at the Board meeting that month, Mr. Tucker was elected to succeed to his position, at the salary received by Mr. Taylor, namely \$1,500.

Mr. Tucker is a half second cousin to Mr. J. E. Wannamaker.

1. Prof. S. K. Martin. S. W. EVANS.

When Mr. B. C. Hard, who was acting as Book-keeper died in March, 1908, Mr. Tucker, who had filled the position of Assistant Book-keeper, was promoted. The vacancy of Assistant Book-keeper was filled

filled by the election of Mr. Evans on motion of Col, Donaldson, a member of the Finance Committee. He was given the salary which Mr. Tucker had been receiving, namely \$1,100. There is no record as to whether or not Pres. Mell recommended this appointment, but from a testimonial letter under date of Nov. 10, 1909, I quote the following expressions by Dr. Mell:-

"Mr. Evans has been connected with the work of the Treasurer's office for some time, and has given entire satisfaction, both to the Treasurer and to myself. He is a gentlemen of exemplary habits, fine character and attractive disposition.*****. He is very faithful in discharging all duties and obligations placed upon him. I speak of him in highest terms as a man of character, and as a faithful officer. I should hate very much indeed to see him leave Clemson College.***** Any one who may need the services of a young man ***** who is equipped with energy and excellent ability, will find in Mr. Evans such a man."

Mr. Evans is a son of Mr. W. D. Evans.

MISS MINNIE B. WANNAMAKER.

The minutes of the Board contain no record of the appointment of any of the President's stenographers. At the February meeting, 1900, the following resolution was passed:-

"That Pres. Hartzog be authorized to employ a stenographer and typewriter, not to exceed \$40.00 per month."

Pres. Hartzog first selected Miss Shirley, a graduate of Winthrop College, and after her marriage to Prof. Frissell in 1901, he appointed Miss Wannamaker. There is no record on the minutes of the Board of the appointment either of Miss Shirley or of Miss Wannamaker.

Miss Wannamaker states that when Dr. Mell assumed the Presidency of the College, he offered her continuance of her position as stenographer.

Miss Wannamaker is a niece of Mr. J. E. Wannamaker.

Mr. B. E. Martin was elected August 8, 1898, to the position of teacher in the Sub-Fresh Department, at a salary of \$500.00, to begin the following September 1st.

At the June Meeting, 1899, along with Messrs Lee and Klugh, his salary was raised to \$600.00. At the February Meeting, 1900, along with Messrs Lee and Klugh, his salary was raised to \$800.00. Several others had their salaries raised at the same time. At the March Meeting, 1901, his salary was raised to \$1,000.

During the summer of 1901, Mr. Martin married Miss Corvey Simpson. Previous to this, he had no relation to any member of the Board.

At the June Meeting, 1902, in accordance with the general

At the July Meeting, 1900, when another general increase of salaries was made by The Honorable Board of Trustees, of the faculty members, his salary was raised to \$1,000.00, and his rank changed from Assistant to Professor.

In accordance with instructions from your President, I have made a careful investigation into the circumstances surrounding the election, appointment and promotion of the teachers and officers of the College who are related to members of this Board, and who are referred to in the article which Pres. Mell gave to the Legislative Committee last December.

In making this report, I have consulted the minutes of the Board, the correspondence files of the President's office, and have given each teacher or officer concerned an opportunity to make a full statement of his case. Putting together the information gained from these various sources, I believe the following to be an accurate and impartial statement of the facts in connection with the appointment, election and promotion of the following teachers and officers:-

S. M. MARTIN.

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scheme of salary adjustment suggested by Pres. Mell, and approved by a special Committee consisting of Messrs Simpson, Tillman, Norris and Pres. Mell, Mr. Martin's salary was raised to \$1,200.

At the July Meeting, 1908, when another general increase of salaries was made, affecting a large number of the faculty members, his salary was raised to \$1,700, and his rank changed from Assistant to Associate Professor.

At the July Meeting, 1908, upon the recommendation of Pres. Mell, Prof. Martin was unanimously elected Professor of Mathematics, at the usual professor's salary, \$1,900. It seems that at the March meeting, 1908, the President did not recommend Prof. Martin for election, and he was not elected. However, the office records show that at the July meeting, his election was made as above stated, upon the recommendation of President Mell.

W. W. KLUGH.

Messrs Klugh and Lee were elected as Assistants, December 14, 1896, at a salary of \$300.00. At the July meeting, 1897, their salaries were increased to \$325.00. At the June meeting, 1898, Major Klugh was relieved of duties in the Military Department, and detailed to give his entire time to the Sub-Freshman work, and his salary was increased to \$600.00 per annum. At the June meeting, 1899, he was transferred to the Mechanical Department as an Assistant Instructor, and his salary, along with Messrs Lee and Martin, was raised to \$800.00, to commence the following Sept. 1st. At the February meeting, 1900, along with Messrs Lee and Martin, his salary was raised to \$900.00.

During the summer of 1901, he was married to Miss Jean S. Simpson. Prior to this time, he was not related to any member of the Board.

At the June meeting, 1903, when Pres. Mell's system of salaries was recommended by the Board Committee consisting of Messrs Simpson, Tillman, Norris and Pres. Mell, he was made Assistant Professor, and his salary, along with others, was raised to \$1,200.

The letter files of the President show that Mr. Robinson

When the general increase of salaries was made at the July meeting, 1906, Mr. Klugh's salary, along with the other Assistant Professors, was raised to \$1,500.

A. G. HOLMES.

Mr. B. H. Mr. Holmes was elected to fill the Chair vacated by the promotion of Mr. M. E. Bradley, as Instructor in English, History and Geography, at a salary of \$1,200, at the July meeting, 1906. Mr. Holmes states that he has it upon good authority that Pres. Mell nominated him for the place, and a letter from Pres. Mell to Mr. Holmes, under date of July 18th, in which he congratulates him upon his election, seems to confirm Mr. Holmes' information. At the end of his first year of service, Mr. Holmes was permanently elected upon the recommendation of Pres. Mell. This is stated in a letter from Dr. Mell to Mr. Holmes under date of August 26, 1907.

At the July meeting, 1908, the Board decided to elect an Assistant in the Division of History, and the President of the College presented the names of Mr. A. G. Holmes and Mr. J. H. Hook as applicants. However, no election resulted. In the minutes of the August meeting, 1908, the following item appears:-

"The attention of the Board was invited by the President of the College to a vacancy in the History Department of the College, and for this position, Dr. Mell, the President, presented the applications of Professors J. H. Hook and A. G. Holmes, Clemson College, with the recommendation that Prof. Holmes be elected to fill the vacancy."

Prof. Holmes was then elected to his present position as Assistant Professor of History, with no increase of salary over his previous position.

Previous to his connection with the College, Mr. Holmes was married to Miss Anna, daughter of Col. R. W. Simpson.

B. H. JOHNSTONE.

At the close of the session of 1905, Mr. S. W. Reeves, Assistant Professor of Mathematics, resigned. Mr. J. E. Hunter was promoted to Mr. Reeves' place, leaving vacant Mr. Hunter's position. To this latter position, Mr. Johnstone was appointed by Pres. Mell in August, 1905. The letter files of the President show that Mr. Johnstone

was first brought to the notice of the Mathematical Department by Prof. J. E. Hunter, who was a candidate for promotion, (See his letter of July 20, 1905). Mr. R. A. Abrams of Liberty was also an applicant for the place, and was, I understand, recommended by Mr. Alan Johnstone of the Board, who was not at the time aware that Mr. B. H. Johnstone was applying for the position. Prof. Johnstone was recommended to Dr. Mell by Dr. E. S. Joynes of the University of South Carolina, and by other prominent educators, as well as by several members of our faculty.

The first record of any trustee action in regard to Mr. Johnstone is at the July meeting, 1906, about a year after his appointment by the President. At this meeting, he was elected to the position of Assistant Professor, teaching Mathematics, German and French. At the same meeting, having served out his trial year, as prescribed by the By-laws, he was also re-elected to the same position.

At the Feb. meeting, 1907, he was relieved from the teaching of French and German.

At the July meeting, 1908, Pres. Mell recommended that Asst. Prof. Shanklin be promoted to the position of Associate Prof. Mathematics, vice Prof. Martin promoted, and that Assistant Professors Hunter, Johnstone and Bramlett be promoted in line. This gave Prof. Johnstone the position of Assistant Professor of Mathematics, at a salary of \$1,500.

Prof. Johnstone is a half nephew of Mr. Alan Johnstone, President of your Board.

M. E. BRADLEY.

At the July meeting, 1901, Mr. Bradley was elected Tutor, at a salary of \$50.00 per month. Mr. Bradley states that this election was based upon the recommendation of Dr. Hartzog, who was then President of the College.

At the June meeting, 1903, when the general scheme of salaries proposed by President Mell, and recommended by a Committee consisting of Messrs Simpson, Tillman, Norris and Pres. Mell, was adopted, Mr. Bradley, along with Messrs Gantt, Hunter, Dargan and

Parker, was raised to \$700.00.

At the July meeting, 1904, his salary was raised to \$900. Mr. Bradley states that this is in accordance with a recommendation of Pres. Mell. At the July meeting, 1906, Prof. McLucas having resigned, a vacancy occurred in the English Division of the Academic Department, and Mr. Bradley was elected Assistant Professor in that Division, at a salary of \$1,500.

Mr. Bradley is the son of the former Life Trustee, Mr. J. E. Bradley. His brother on the Board, Mr. W. W. Bradley, was not a member of that body at the time Mr. Bradley was elected.

T. W. KEITT.

Pres. Hartzog appointed Mr. Keitt as Assistant Professor in English, to act as a substitute for Prof. Daniel, who had been given a year's leave of absence. This appointment was made during the summer of 1901, and his salary was made \$100.00 per month, beginning Sept. 1st. At the March meeting of the Board, 1902, Dr. Hartzog recommended Prof. Keitt for a permanent place, and he was elected as "teacher in Fresh. and Sub-Fresh." at a salary of \$1,200 per annum.

In 1903, upon the recommendation of Pres. Mell, and a Committee consisting of Messrs Simpson, Tillman, Norris and Pres. Mell, Prof. Keitt was made an Assistant Professor, and given the salary attaching to that position, which was the same as he had been receiving as "Teacher in Fresh. and Sub-Fresh.", namely \$1,200.

When the general increase of salaries was made at the July meeting, 1906, Mr. Keitt's salary, along with the other Assistant Professors, was raised to \$1,500.

Prof. Keitt is a cousin by blood, and a brother-in-law by marriage, to Mr. John E. Wannamaker, one of the Life Trustees.

THOMAS E. KEITT.

In February, 1907, a vacancy occurred in the Analytical work of the Chemical Department, due to the resignation of Mr. C. C. McDonnell. Col. M. B. Hardin, Director of the Department, recommended to Pres. Mell the appointment of Mr. Keitt, and in

February, 1907, Pres. Mell appointed him Assistant Chemist at a salary of \$900.00. At the meeting of the Board, Feb. 26, 1907, his appointment was confirmed.

The following minute is taken from the meeting of the Board, July 14, 1908, which has reference to Mr. Keitt's election to his present position as Chemist to the Experiment Station:-

"The position of Chemist for S.C. Experiment Station was then taken up. The President of the College submitted the following names of applicants as recommended by Prof. M. B. Hardin, - namely, - Charles Walker, Charleston; G. C. Olson, Illinois; R. D. Gilbert, Connecticut; M. E. Matheson, Kansas; N. C. Hamner, Virginia. Moved by Col. Simpson that Mr. Thomas E. Keitt, now a Chemist in the Chemical Department of the College, be elected to the position of State Chemist.

The motion was unanimously adopted. The President cast the unanimous ballot, Mr. Wannamaker being excused from voting."

The salary of the Station Chemist was fixed in the schedule of Experiment Station salaries adopted by the Board in March, 1908, at \$1,900.

In connection with the above, I quote the following recommendation from the report of Prof. J. N. Harper, Director of the Experiment Station, to Pres. Mell under date of July 8, 1908:-

"That Mr. Thomas E. Keitt be appointed to the position as Chemist to the Experiment Station, and that he receive a salary of \$1,200 per year."

Mr. Keitt is a nephew of Mr. John E. Wannamaker.

W. C. TUCKER.

In January, 1905, Pres. Mell appointed Mr. Tucker as Assistant to the Commandant at a salary of \$40.00 per month, and with the promise to recommend him for permanent position at the February meeting of the Board. (Letter of Dr. Mell under date of Jan. 13, 1905) At the February meeting, 1905, the action of the President in appointing Mr. Tucker was approved. At the June meeting, 1905, his appointment as Secretary to the Commandant was made permanent, at a salary of \$600.00.

In December, 1906, Mr. George E. Taylor died, and Mr. Tucker, through the President, made application for the position. At the meeting of the Board in December, 1906, he was elected Assistant Book-keeper at a salary of \$1,100, Mr. Hard being promoted to Mr. Taylor's position as Book-keeper. In March, 1908, Mr. Hard died, and

at the Board meeting that month, Mr. Tucker was elected to succeed to his position, at the salary received by Mr. Taylor, namely \$1,500.

Mr. Tucker is a half second cousin to Mr. J. E. Wannamaker.

S. W. EVANS.

When Mr. B. C. Hard, who was acting as Book-keeper died in March, 1908, Mr. Tucker, who had filled the position of Assistant Book-keeper, was promoted. The vacancy of Assistant Book-keeper was filled by the election of Mr. Evans on motion of Col. Donaldson, a member of the Finance Committee. He was given the salary which Mr. Tucker had been receiving, namely \$1,100. There is no record as to whether or not Pres. Mell recommended this appointment, but from a testimonial letter under date of Nov. 10, 1909, I quote the following expressions by Dr. Mell:-

"Mr. Evans has been connected with the work of the Treasurer's office for some time, and has given entire satisfaction, both to the Treasurer and to myself. He is a gentleman of exemplary habits, fine character and attractive disposition. He is very faithful in discharging all duties and obligations placed upon him. I speak of him in highest terms as a man of character, and as a faithful officer. I should hate very much indeed to see him leave Clemson College. Any one who may need the services of a young man who is equipped with energy and excellent ability, will find in Mr. Evans such a man."

Mr. Evans is a son of Mr. W. D. Evans.

MISS MINNIE B. WANNAMAKER.

The minutes of the Board contain no record of the appointment of any of the President's stenographers. At the February meeting, 1900, the following resolution was passed:-

"That Pres. Hartzog be authorized to employ a stenographer and typewriter, not to exceed \$40.00 per month."

Pres. Hartzog first selected Miss Shirley, a graduate of Winthrop College, and after her marriage to Prof. Frissell in 1901, he appointed Miss Wannamaker. There is no record on the minutes of the Board of the appointment either of Miss Shirley or Miss Wannamaker.

Miss Wannamaker states that when Dr. Mell assumed the Presidency of the College, he offered her continuance of her position as stenographer.

Miss Wannamaker is a niece of Mr. J. E. Wannamaker.

The following is a note on the original employment of the parties named in this report:-

- 1. Prof. S. M. Martin. No relation to any member of the Board at the time of election.
- 2. Prof. W. W. Klugh. No relation to any member of the Board at the time of election.
- 3. Prof. A. G. Holmes. Recommended for election by Pres. Mell.
- 4. Prof. B. H. Johnstone. Appointed by Pres. Mell. (Appointment confirmed by Board.)
- 5. Prof. M. E. Bradley. Recommended for election by Pres. Hartzog.
- 6. Prof. T. W. Keitt. Appointed by Pres. Hartzog for temporary service. Recommended by Pres. Hartzog for a permanent place during the period of substitution for Prof. Daniel.
- 7. Mr. T. E. Keitt. Appointed Assistant Chemist by Pres. Mell.
- 8. Mr. W. C. Tucker. Appointed by Pres. Mell.
- 9. Mr. S. W. Evans. No records as to whether recommended by Pres. Mell or not.
- 10. Miss M.B. Wannamaker. Appointed by Pres. Hartzog. Continued in service by Pres. Mell.
