MINUTES OF THE BRETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF CLEMSON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, MARCH 9th. & 10th. 1909.

The regular semi-annual meeting of the Board of Trustees of Clemson Agricultural College was convened at the College at 8:30 o'clock, P. M., March 9, 1909. The meeting was called to order and the Secretary was instructed to call the roll. following members were present:-

The bill of Mrs. J. P. Lewis for entertaining the Committee from the Farmers' Union of South Carolina amounting to \$20. having been ordered paid by the Board, the Secretary was instructed, by the President of the Board of Trustees, to incorporate this action in the minutes of the Board.

The report from the Committee of the Farmers' Union was taken up and the Secretary was instructed to read the report and to incorporate the same in the Minutes of the Board. Secretary read as follows:-

We the undersigned, your committee, appointed to visit Clemson Agricultural College and report on the conditions of the Agricultural Department of that college, beg leave to report that we went to the College on the 28th. of January, in accordance with instructions, and, at our request, were met there by Col. R. W. Simpson, a member of the Board of Trustees. Everything in the College was thrown open to our inspection, including all of the departments, the mess-hall, barracks, and kitchen. In fact, nothing was held back. we examined carefully into the workings of all of the departments, especially the Agricultural Department of the College, and also examined into the curriculum, and, we report very frankly that we find that the Agricultural

Department has not been doing work in a way that we think is satisfactory to the farmers and is not equipped as it should be. We talked freely and frankly with the Director of this Department, Dr. D. N. Barrow, who has been recently elected Professor of Borrow Agriculture in the College, and we are satisfied that he is the proper man for the place, and if he is given a free-hand by the Board of Trustees he will make the Department of Agriculture all that the farmers of the State can expect.

We are satisfied, and so report, that the Board of Trustees have accomplished a wonderful work at Clemson College. They have made some mistakes but when we consider the great work that they have accomplished these mistakes ought not to be counted

against them.

We find, and so report, that the Privilege Tax and other frivilg income of the College has been judiciously expended, and it would Tax be most unfortunate for the income of the College to be in any-way curtalied. We, therefore, recommend that it would be unwise and disastrous to the interest of the farming element, especially, to in any-way interfere with or curtail the privilege tax. The farmers are being protected against fraud in the analysis of fertilizers to an extent that we were surprised to find.

We find, upon examination, that there are three hundred and twenty five students in the College taking the Agricultural course.

We further recommend that the farmers of the State give their hearty support to Clemson College, as we believe that by so doing the Agricultural Department of the College will be developed to meet the desires of the Farmers, and that it will be so developed that it will afford opportunities not only to the farmers' sons but will be a great help to the farmers themselves in the development of the gricultural interest of the

State.
We recommend that the Board of Trustees discontinue the Fermers' Institutes, and instead present plan of conducting Farmers' Institutes, and instead that they give the farmers short courses in practical agriculture; holding these short courses or schools at convenient places in the State, changing from place to place as often as the conditions of the Gollege will permit.

I would, therefore, suggest that the Dairy and Farm Herd be supported entirely by the funds received from the cadets; that is, let the cadet fund pay all of the expenses of the Dairy and Farm Herd, and, in return, give the entire output from the Dairy and Farm Herd to the cadet mess and hospital. In other words, just transfer this account from the college books to the cadet fund books, and run the Dairy and Farm Herd the same as the Truck Farm is now run. cost and money derived from these sales is turned back into the

2.- I would suggest that the interest received form college deposits be not deposited in the banks and taken up on the college books, as is now done, until all interest which the college owes on account of everdrafts is paid, and then deposit to the credit of the college the remaining balance, or the actual income 2.- I would suggest that the interest received form college

3.- Electric lights are furnished to residents of the "Hill" dig to at approximate cost, and, as mentioned above in regard to the Dairy, this money expended for furnishing these lights is appropriated by the board of Trustees and expended from college funds, and the proceeds from the sale of these lights, - which is at cost to the user, - is taken up on the college books, thereby making a showing of a much larger income than is actually the case.

4. The same can be said of the Farm. Approximately \$10,000, is expended annually for the support of this department, and, in return, about five hundred to one-thousand dollars is received back from the sale of pigs, ect.

In order to carry out these suggestions it will be necessary to adopt a similar resolution to the following:-

2.- That all labor, feed, equipment, ect., necessary for the running of the Dairy and Farm Herd be paid for from the Cadet

3.- That such feed as is grown on the Farm, necessary for the feeding of the Farm Herd, be purchased from the Farm at an estimated actual cost of production, and paid for from the Dairy and Farm Herd Divisions of the Cadet Funds.

4.- That a bill be rendered monthly against the Dairy and Farm Herd account for milking and other labor rendered by the Convicts, and such money paid by the Dairy and Farm Herd for labor or feed furnished by the Farm shall be credited to the Farm.

5.- That the Farm Superintendent shall supervise, under the direction of the President of the College and the Farm Committee of the Board of Trustees, the feeding and general care of the Farm Herd; and, he shall see that all milk from this Farm Herd is promptly delivered to the Dairy Superintendent, and shall take a receipt from the Dairy for such milk as is delivered.

6.- The Dairy Superintendent shall receipt to the Farm Superintendent for all milk delivered, and shall keep an account of the whole milk, skimmed milk, and butter delivered to the cadet mess or hospital.

7.- That the milk produced by the South Carolina Experiment Station Herd shall be purchased by the Dairy, and paid for from the Dairy Account of the Cadet Funds at such price per pound for whole milk as shall be fixed by the South Carolina Experiment Station Committee and the Farm Committee of the Board of Trustees' 573

That this milk when received shall be treated in the same manner as the Farm Herd milk; that is, receipting to the Station Herd Superintendent for milk as is done with the Farm Herd.

8 .- That the Dairy Superintendent, the Farm Superintendent; and the Station Herd Superintendent render, through the President of the College, to the Board of Trustees at their annual meeting in July, a report of all milk produced or received.

9.- That the authority is hereby granted to sell for cash to milk, wam, residents of Clemson College any surplus milk, cream, or butter that may accumulate during the absence of the cadets on vacation at the regular market-price. Such money received from this source shall be credited to the Dairy Account.

10 .- Taht the President, Treasurer and Bookkeeper keep a set of books for such petty accounts as interest; Norris Medal; rents; magistrate's fines; heat, light and water, ect., and that all bills against these accounts be paid from these petty accounts the same as is done on the Collge books, but no bill or account shall be paid from these accounts except such as is ordered by the Board of Trustees, by appropriation.

11.- That the President and Treasurer are hereby instructed to pay for coal, or labor from the Heat, Light and Water Account of the petty cash all moneys received from the sale of electricity to the residents of Clemson College; and that the sum so paid from this account to replace that for which the college has already paid shall be left to the credit of the appropriation made by the Board of Trustees on the College books, and no money shall be expended from these accounts for articles or labor except for which specific appropriations have been made by the Board of Trustees. As mentioned above, when such expenditures are made they must be made for such items only as are appropriated for by the Board of Trustees, and the amount so expended must be left to the credit of that specific item on the college appropriation.

12.- That all moneys received from the sale of pigs, feed,
pign for and such other articles as are sold by the Farm, shall be
credited to the Farm on thee books provided for herein, and that
all moneys from this source shall be expended for seed, fertilizer
labor and such other articles as are appropriated for by the
coard of Trustees, and only such money shall be expended from this
source as is specifically appropriated by the Board of Trustees,
and such money when expended shall be left to the credit of that fertilizers, account and item of the college appropriation.

> 13.- That all feed, labor, or other article furnished by the College Farm to Division of the College, by order of the Board of Trustees, shall be receipted for to the Superintendent of the Farm excepting such feed and labor as is heretofore provided for in paragraphs 2., 3., and 4. of this resolution.

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14.- The actual profit from any account, such as interest, magistrate's fines, ect., shall be deposited and credited to the College, and a regular acconting made therefor to the Board of Trustees of all such profits.

15 .- That the President, Treasurer and Bookkeeper are hereby Occounts instructed and ordered to run the accounts herein mentioned the same as the college accounts are now run, -- giving a receipt for all moneys received, and keeping a carbon copy of each receipt given, and also taking a receipt for all moneys paid out.

16.- That the Tresurer and Bookkeeper are hereby instructed and ordered to prepare an itemized statement showing the exact status of each of the accounts herein mentioned and submit the same to the Finance Committee of the Board of Trustees annually.

17.- That the above instructions shall not be construed to mean that any thing can be purchased from these accounts, but only such labor, feed, and other articles as are approved by the

Board of Trustees and authority given to purchase, as herein provided for; but, when such articles, labor, or feed are paid for these accounts, the anounts so paid must be left to the credit of that etc. specific item of the College appropriation.

18 .- That the sum of \$100., if so much be necessary, is hereby appropriated for the purchase of the necessary books, forms, and files for the carrying out of the instructions herein.

19.- That this resolution shall take effect July 1, 1909., at which time all previous resolutions in conflict with this resolution shall be repealed; and that the Treasurer and Bookkeeper are hereby instructed to provide the necessary books for carrying out the instructions herein atvonce.
