

Mansion Is Disputed

Fort Hill Is Former Cal- houn Home And Not His "Mansion"

CLEMSON, Mar. 24.—The Calhoun mansion at Clemson is not the Calhoun mansion—it is Fort Hill.

Mrs. A. G. Holmes, chairman of the Fort Hill committee of the United Daughters of the Confederacy, announced today that the U. D. C., of South Carolina is making an intensive effort to correct this mistake that has come to be accepted through common usage. Many of the original John C. Calhoun letters now preserved in the Clemson library give undisputable authority to the statement that the name of the house was changed to Fort Hill soon after John C. Calhoun bought the homestead from his brother-in-law, James E. Calhoun. The house had formerly been called Clergy Hall and was owned by the Rev. James McElhenny, pastor of the Old Stone Church near Fredston.
