Roy Pearce, president of Clemson's current graduating class, estimated today that the seniors will contribute "several thousand dollars worth of really good clothes." Pearce also said that a letter has been written to Bundles For Britain, Inc., in New York City to ascertain whether the clothes should be sent direct to New York or through local offices.

The articles of Clemson wearing apparel to be collected in the huge drive by the seniors include the regulation cadet uniform, complete with trousers, coat, and mackinaw. Old shoes, shirts, sweaters and all other articles of clothing will be accepted in the drive.

During a four-year stay at Clemson, a student buys approximately \$125.00 worth of uniform clothing, the cost of which is included in the regular college tuition. Manufactured to specifications from the best fabrics obtainable, the uniforms always have months of good wear left in them after they are of no use to the graduated cadet.
